Let's Walk4Hearing on October 18; Here are Walk Details, How to Contribute



October's biggest HLAA-NJ activity in New Jersey is our annual Walk4Hearing, to be held Sunday, October 18, 2015 at Mercer County Park, Hughes Drive, West Windsor and Hamilton, NJ. Registration and Check-In start at 10 AM, and the walk begins at 11 AM.

Walk4Hearing events are fundraising 5K (3.1 miles) walks held across the United States. Since its formation in 2006, Walk4Hearing has raised over \$9 million dollars for programs and services for people with hearing loss, and has grown into the largest awareness and fundraising event for the Hearing Loss Association of America® (HLAA). Collaborating with local HLAA chapters, Walk4Hearing educates the general public about hearing loss while easing the associated stigma. Striving to make hearing loss a public health issue, thousands of people of all ages, races, and backgrounds have come together to display their compassion for the cause and to make hearing loss an issue of national concern. HOW to Contribute:

Be Sure to Correctly Designate Your Intended Walk Beneficiary

If it's the donor's intention to benefit people with hearing loss *inside* the State of New Jersey, it's important to understand the importance of registering correctly. Donors first choice should be to designate "HLAA New Jersey State Association," as 50% is shared with HLAA National (which is what happens with any designation) - and 40% would go to HLAA-NJ. Also, as there are other alliance teams, those are listed for people who already know specifically whom they're designating their 40% proceeds for. All others, or just anyone wanting to participate in the NJ Walk4Hearing should be selecting HLAA New Jersey State Association if they are not specifically intending to donate to any other group. In prior years, some Walk funds did not go to donors intended beneficiaries because they were not correctly designated during the registration process.

Walk checks should be made payable to "NJ Walk4Hearing." It is important for each donor to carefully select what gets checked off when registering to participate in the Walk. On the first online page, there's a dropdown list of "alliance teams". HLAA New Jersey State Association is listed first - and unless people are walking for specific other causes (like AGBell, or Summit Speech School), then they should choose HLAA-NJ. There is also a category, "HLAA National," which may have misled donors in prior years. When a donor checks off HLAA National, 90% goes to HLAA National and nothing goes to benefit people with hearing loss inside the state of New Jersey, or HLAA-NJ at the state level. So, it becomes critically important, both prior to the Walk, and definitely on the day of the Walk, for donors to make the correct designation. It's only after all the money is collected, either by check or credit card, that it is divided up according to the category specifically designated by each respective donor.

Anna Gilmore Hall Updates HLAA-NJ re CDC's Omission of Hearing Loss Disability, Cites CDC Steps of Recent Weeks

"Nice to hear from you. I am sorry it has taken me so long to respond back to you, but we were waiting for a couple more pieces of information from CDC. CDC has been open to our suggestions and we feel while not all issues have been resolved, we are

making a good start. Below is a summary of what has happened over the last few weeks.

“In August, when the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) issued the results of a survey that for the first time asked questions about disabilities, we were stunned to find that people with hearing loss were entirely left out.

“HLAA sent out letters to CDC, to the White House, issued a press release and an action alert asking consumers to express their thinking of CDC’s survey. Many of our members sent in emails with compelling stories, making it clear we should have been counted from the start.

“As a result, CDC contacted HLAA. We learned that CDC has been working for years with states to collect health care data under the Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS) survey. In **2013**, for the first time, CDC included questions regarding disability in BRFSS. They tell us that they excluded people with hearing loss because the survey is done via telephone; they were concerned that the population of people with hearing loss would be undercounted as a result of their collection method.

“We find this unacceptable. Clearly, people with hearing loss have access to telephones; cell phones, captioned phones, VRS and even the old TTY’s. In addition, had they been truly concerned that people with hearing loss do not own phones, they could have changed the data collection method. Instead of underrepresenting us, they chose not to count us at all, rendering us invisible once again.

“In our talks with CDC, we were asked to write a letter of support for inclusion of a question on hearing loss in upcoming surveys, which we provided. We have since learned that there will be a question seeking to find people with hearing loss in the 2016 survey. It is a start.

“However, the question that was approved, “Are you deaf or do you have a significant hearing difficulty” does not go nearly far enough. If you are a public health official trying to tease out information about the health of your community, one would think it would make sense to make the most of the opportunity. It just makes sense to learn whether health care needs of residents who are deaf are different than those who have a hearing loss.

“HLAA also asked that CDC’s marketing materials for this survey makes it clear that until 2016, they only have a piece of the picture of health in the disability community. (Surveys done in 2014 and 2015 did not have the hearing loss question). We asked to be part of a cross-disability advisory council to ensure that mistakes like this never happen again. It has been said before, and truly is applicable in this case, “nothing about us without us”. This would never have happened had we been there when decisions were being made.

“We are continuing to work with CDC. They have been open to our suggestions and we feel while not all issues have been resolved, we are making a good start. We have our members to thank for that. Their voices are being heard.”

PCAST

HLAA has submitted written comments to the President's Council of Advisors on Science and Technology (PCAST). PCAST is an advisory group of the nation's leading scientists and engineers who directly advise the President and the Executive Office of the President. The Council makes policy recommendations in the many areas where understanding of science, technology, and innovation is key to strengthening our economy and forming policy that works for the American people. On September 18, the Council discussed how technologies and policies for hearing aids affect older Americans. Lise Hamlin, director of public policy at HLAA provided recommendations to the Council on behalf of HLAA. In addition to our recommendations, HLAA has provided our most recent policy statements to the committee – "Screening for Hearing Loss in Primary Health Care Settings," "Wider Access to the Full Spectrum of Hearing Technology Benefiting People with Hearing Loss," "Medicare Coverage of Hearing Aids and Aural Rehabilitation," and a policy paper by Dr. Margaret Wallhagen titled "Hearing Loss: Impact, Policy Implications, and Future Directions."
