Quick Overview of the Legislation

Requires Induction Loop Assistive Listening Systems in new construction and renovations for

- O Meeting rooms and auditoriums including Medical Facilities
- O Countertop Applications including Pharmacies and Information Desks

What are Induction Loop Systems (also referred to as Hearing Loops)?

- Induction Loop assistive listening systems allow people with hearing aids and cochlear implants to turn
 on their "t-coil" settings and hear whatever is spoken into a microphone (t-coils are in most hearing
 aids and all cochlear implant processors)
- No additional equipment is required for the user efficient, discreet, most preferred by users
- Helps people with hearing aids and cochlear implants (CIs), which are a majority of people with hearing loss. There are an estimated over 800,000 people with hearing loss in NJ.
- Prevalent in Europe, several US states and Washington, DC have hundreds of looped locations.

Induction Loop Systems are the equivalent of RAMPS - they allow efficient COMMUNICATION ACCESS through easy-to-use hearing aid/cochlear implant connectivity, equivalent to PHYSICAL ACCESS.

- Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) stipulates assistive listening systems in certain places of public accommodation, but this law is generally ignored and complaint-driven.
- Most public meeting rooms that are supposed to have assistive listening systems are NOT equipped, ignoring the ADA.
- This bill requires adherence to updated construction codes, so adherence is built into the law.

- Some NJ locations that have induction loops: Puffin Cultural Center (Teaneck), Princeton Library, Hunterdon Medical Center, Hunterdon Libraries, Montclair State U. classroom, Wegman's pharmacy/cashier counters, several churches and synagogues.

Induction loop systems greatly transform the experience of listening and understanding for individuals who use hearing aids or cochlear implants - ease of use and sound quality.

Communication access is a right by law - and Induction Loops are the preferred method of choice.
